### **Getting to the Money: Grant Writing Made Easy – Part 1**

Many program providers have varied backgrounds and experience levels, which could either help or hinder their ability to effectively identify and craft high-quality grant narratives. This workshop introduces participants to the foundational elements of successful grant writing. OST providers will learn how to identify fundable program ideas, understand common components of foundational grant applications, and align their program goals with funder priorities. Participants will also explore best practices for preparing to pursue grant opportunities. 

This workshop will also cover budgeting basics, including allowable costs, budget justification, and common pitfalls that can weaken funding applications. Participants will identify potential upcoming funding opportunities and leave with practical tools and best practices to enhance the competitiveness and sustainability of their grant submissions.

### **STEM with an "A": Hands-on Art Workshop for OST Programs**
